
Research Skills or Questions to discuss:

BIRLS for 1900s and 2000s military records https://www.birls.org


The Beneficiary Identification Records Locator Subsystem (BIRLS) database was originally created and maintained by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (the VA). It provides an index to basic biographical information on more than 18 million deceased American veterans who received some sort of veterans benefits in their lifetime, including health care, disability or life insurance policies, educational benefits (the GI Bill), mortgage assistance (VA loans), and more. The BIRLS database includes people who served in all branches of the US military, including some branches that no longer exist, such as the Women's Army Corps (WACs) and the Army Air Corps, as well as a few associated non-military groups and government agencies, such as NOAA. It even includes files for some non-US nationals, including veterans of the Philippine Commonwealth Army and Philippine Scouts and Guerillas, who served prior to and during the Second World War.

In 2018, the non-profit organization Reclaim The Records filed what would become a multiyear but ultimately successful Freedom of Information Act or FOIA lawsuit against the VA, winning the right to obtain and publish the majority of the BIRLS database. The data was finally handed over by the VA in 2022. Through this website, the BIRLS database is now freely searchable online and even downloadable as free, public, and open data, for the first time.

Finding a name listed in the BIRLS database means that you can make a free FOIA request for a copy of that deceased veteran's full VA claims file, which may contain hundreds of pages of never-before-seen biographical and historical material about the veteran, their military service, and their interactions with the VA.

Cemetery Corner by Janet Richardson The Harper Family

It all began when Arthur Harper who was born in County Antrim, Ireland in 1832 came to the California gold fields in 1855. Arthur came the Peace River in the Yukon Territory in 1873 in search of gold in the Klondike. Arthur then made his way to Fort Yukon with Alfred Mayo and Jack McQuesten and found the geology favorable for mining gold. In 1874, Arthur met and married 14 year old Seentahna, aka Jennie Bosco, at Koyukuk. They had eight children before they separated in 1895. (next page)



Seven of the eight would be educated in boarding schools in San Francisco. Jennie's eighth child, Walter Harper, was raised around Tanana in a more traditional Koyukon lifestyle.

Walter attended St. Marks Mission in Nenana and his exemplary outdoor skills and pleasant personality caught the attention of missionary and explorer, Hudson Stuck. In 1912, Walter accompanied Stuck on the first successful 1913 ascent of the south and highest peak of Mt. McKinley. Walter, who lead the ascent, became the first man to set foot on top of North America's tallest point.

Tragic struck when Walter and his new bride, Frances Wells Harper, perished in the 1918 sinking of the Princess Sophia in Lynn Canal as it headed south from Skagway. They are buried side by side in Evergreen Cemetery in Juneau.

His father Arthur would never know of the great feat his son accomplished as he passed away in San Francisco of





tuberculosis on November 24, 1897 and was buried at the IOOF Cemetery and later reburied at Colma.

Arthur's son, Alfred Mayo Harper, passed away in San Francisco in 1936 and is also buried in Colma. Another son, Samuel Harper, passed away in Fairbanks in 1931 and is buried at Clay Street Cemetery.



Golden Heart Toastmasters celebrate 20th anniversary


The Golden Heart Toastmasters Club of Fairbanks will observe its 20th anniversary at 7 p.m., Saturday at the Switzerland.



Members of Tundra Toastmasters for Elelson AFB have been invited to the dinner. It will also be a ladies night, and all wives may attend.







Key aspects of AI in genealogy:

Transcription:

Al can read and transcribe difficult-to-decipher handwriting on old documents, greatly improving search capabilities.

Image analysis:

Al can identify faces in old photos, colorize them, and even repair damaged images. Data matching:

Al can compare information across multiple databases to find potential matches and link records together.

Family tree construction:

All can suggest possible relatives to add to your family tree based on existing information. A recent development in genealogy research is the increased use of artificial intelligence (AI) to transcribe old, handwritten records, identify faces in photos, match data across different databases, and even suggest potential relatives to add to your family tree, making it significantly easier to access and analyze historical information about your ancestors; this includes features like automated translation for records in foreign languages.

President's Report:

Received email from Norway, Amy put it on the screen. Morten Bakkeli wanted to know about a man living in Fairbanks as he was doing a story on him for a publication in Norway. What did he do at his jobs? Amy responded where he worked, lived. Dec 12, & Dec 26 - She asked Morton to send a write up that included the information she'd sent him, but he never did. James Bartlett said to look up online to see if Morton posted anything. If it is in Norwegian, Elizabeth Cook said to run it through Google translate. No payment, no "thank you", but Amy said it was fun to look up things in the Polk Directories. Cheryl said she remembered a Speilberg family here in Fairbanks but doesn't remember his first name. Husband, wife and three daughters. Two daughters are still alive she thought. Ann Spielberg was the wife; she worked with the voter registration office. (Update: Dave Speilberg died 6/21/92 and Ann Speilberg died 9/23/97; they are both buried at Northern Lights Memorial Park off Yankovich Rd). According to Amy, the Speilbergs divorced, Dave moved back to Norway, and remarried there. According to Cheryl, Dave came back after that 2nd wife died, and he reconnected with the first wife Ann. According to Amy (via research), Dave was first buried at Birch Hill Cemetery, then exhumed and buried next to his ex-wife Ann at Northern Lights Memorial Park.

Vice President's Report

Janet announced that the next meeting is February 25th, and we will hear the North Pole Toastmasters give short talks about their ancestors. Last time was very enjoyable.

I went on eBay (my last name is Manry, and we are all related) Robert Manry was the 1st to come across the Atlantic in a dinghy. He wrote about the adventure in the book, "Tiinkerbell". My bagpipe instructor Dennis Stephens, a librarian in his former days, and

I still have not gotten confirmation from Jamia Alexander-Bell about the Noel Wien Library hosting the exhibit for the month of March or April.

Her comment to me was "why would anyone in Fairbanks be interested in this?".

Loussac library in Anchorage are interested in having the exhibit after us.

My hope is to have the exhibit in place so school aged children can come as a class to view. According to the reference desk, approximately 25,000 patrons come through Noel Wien library every month.

Cheryl Borrong has a book that lists all the people on the ship and tells the story of the post delivery of bodies in Seattle. A statue recently was put up in front of the Doyon offices of Walter Harper, who died on the Princess Sophia. Aldean asked if Cheryl has the book that Mary Ehrlander wrote on Walter Harper? Not sure, she said.

Cheryl shared on screen "Sinking of the Princess Sophia" by Ken Coates and Bill Morrison.

Elizabeth - Coates was a noted Canadian historian; Walter was going off to become a doctor and come back to Alaska.

Cheryl - I was born at Hudson Stuk hospital in Fort Yukon. I was born in October 1945. Dad was a Federal Marshal, and Mom, a Canadian, was the Commissioner. "He'd bring in the bad guys, and she'd sentence them." We were there from April 1945 to April 1946; then moved to Seattle and Port Townsend;

Secretary - we still don't have one; Molly doesn't respond.

Research questions:

Amy - BIRLS files show up when you're hunting; you can't look at the actual file; now you can order the actual file yourself. She shared the BIRLS database (1900-2003) on the screen; you can see any file with an ancestor's name - just fill in form and ask; WWII records weren't available - burned in the 1971 fire; but this is my grandfather's file (was also indexed on Ancestry but I couldn't get at National Archives) and I ordered it.

Service number or dog tag ssa # can be helpful but not necessary.

The website is BIRLS.org

Shared screen - South California fires.

LA fires maps - can look up childhood homes, or addresses of burned homes and historical structures.

recovery.LAcounty.gov - Amy showed how to find the house that include photos (disaster maps-top menu).

James talked about Electrical fires caused previous fires; Aldean said that days news said Eton fire could have been caused by arcing from a substation and wind caught it. Palisades is almost completely gone; historical places are gone; Palisades library gone.

Karen Tanner - Show and Tell

I've been working on genealogy for many years; "we are searching for the truth".

Last week I had an experience with DNA; I lost sleep over this.

My dilemma arose over a DNA connection on my husband's side; My husband passed away years ago. But 16% of shared DNA, that's pretty close; who is this person, I wanted to know.? I tried to find out what it was about, so I finally sent a message to find out more. Ethical challenges in the 21st century can be challenging. What information can be shared and what shouldn't be shared?

Pledge "I will keep confidential unless I receive written permission to tell a third person." Matches don't get to share with others without personal match permission.

I was about to share the info I learned, and I knew it could cause hurt to certain family members.

Amy - It's like you found your dad; you can't go around saying "that's my dad" like you email others about this info, until you obtain permission.

Someone emailed me (Amy) from Ancestry and said your dad is my dad. She was not my half sister, but it could be this line or that line. She is my cousin's half-sister, not my half sister. It wasn't my job to call my cousin and tell her what I'd been told; it was the responsibility of the person who wrote me to reach out. And she did.
