Minutes for FGS Meeting April 22

We met at Fairbanks Distilling at 5 PM to order beverages. In attendance were Amy Stratman, Tanya O'Brien, Aldean Kilbourn, Elizabeth Cook, Cheryl Berrong, Kris and Leonard Thiltgen, Janet Richardson, and guests George Dalton, Betsy Smith and Karen Fox.

At 6 PM, owner Patrick Levy gave us an introduction to the "sitll or brewing" room, and an informational forty minute talk on the background of distillation including the equipment and how he makes his various products. He also talked about the construction of the building, which at one time housed the Fairbanks fire house, the city council chambers and mayor's office, and the telephone switchboard. In his remodeling of the front facade, he kept the outlines of the firehouse doors. He also kept the large side door on 4th street for pickups and deliveries.

Dagfinn Speilberg (born 20 April 1929) was the son of physician Thorleif Tybring Speilberg (1894–1968) and Hedvig Lorentze née Fabricius (1899–1991). His father was born in Tvedestrand, and his mother was born in Namsos. His childhood home was Bøkkerbakken 6, which he later bought from his mother in 1971.

Dagfinn, like his father, was working as a whaler after he graduated from college. He married his college sweetheart Anne-Marie "Tulla" Christensen (born 11 Jan 1931) from Sverdstad in Sandar at the Larvik Church on 7 July 1952.

Dagfinn went to Alaska in 1952 to meet up with a Norwegian friend, Pete Nelson who worked at the Healy River Coal Corporation in Suntrana. He stayed and started working as a mechanic. A year later, his wife joined him.

The couple had three daughters: Linda, Mette and Tina. In 1960, they became Naturalized American citizens. In 1963, the family moved to the city of Fairbanks, due to layoffs, and decided it was best as their girls were starting school. Dave was employed as a maintenance man at Golden Valley Electric Association, Fairbanks Municipal Utilities System, and then Fort Wainwright (civilian). Anne worked for the Cooperative Extension Service, Wien Airlines, then the Fairbanks North Star Borough. She eventually became the head of the Fairbanks Elections Office.

Their home address was 200 Kody Dr in Island Homes subdivision, pictured below (from google maps). The home was in the family for 36 years.






Their marriage was dissolved in 1976 and Dave returned to Norway. He married for the second time on 1 Sept 1977 to Borghild Andersen (1932–1986) from "Ekebakken", the Tenvik farm in Brunlanes. After her death, Dave returned to Fairbanks and reunited with Anne.

Their daughters all married and had children, making them grandparents.

They were both active members of the Pioneers of Alaska and the Sons of Norway. Anne said she was always surprised how many Norwegians there were in Fairbanks.

Dave died of cancer on 21 June 1992 in Fairbanks. He was 63 years old. He was buried at Birch Hill Cemetery in General #3 Ext, Tier 13, Row 9. He was exhumed due to unknown reasons (possibly of poor conditions at Birch Hill), and placed in Northern Lights Cemetery with his ex wife, Anne, who also died of cancer, on 23 Sept 1997.

One daughter, Mette, died in 2016 (also of cancer), and is buried near them at Northern Lights Cemetery.





Ulysses Grant Myers, known as U.G. Myers on documents, grew up in Pennsylvania, working on the family farm. He joined the Army Signal Corp and became a US Weather Bureau weather observer. He was transferred to Washington DC, Boston, New Haven CT, and Denver, before being assigned to Eagle, Alaska. In addition to recording the weather, he was a Notary Public, US Commissioner, and customs broker for incoming boats headed to Dawson City, Yukon during the summer. He also took up mining and had several successful

He married Frances Nelly Ryder in July 1900 (also spelled Nellie on some documents) in Eagle. They enjoyed life in Alaska, with occasional trips Outside. They had no children.

Leaving Alaska in Oct of 1918, he bought a ticket to Seattle with intentions of continuing to New York to see his wife. She resided in Poughkeepsie during many winters, and was there this time due to the ill health of her mother (who ended up dying in Feb 1919).

UG was on the last boat out of Alaska, on the Princess Sophia.

He died on 25 Oct 1918, near Juneau, Alaska. His body was recovered days later.





Miss Nellie Ryder started last Thursday for the Kloudike region where she will meet and marry Ulyses Grant Myers, who has been in the Klondike the past two years. Mrs Ryder accompanied her daughter to Chicago. Miss Ryder is accompanied by a young lady from Circiunati who is also going to the Klondike regions to wed a young minister who is stationed there. A wedding will be celebrated in Dawson City as soon as the bride, Miss Nellie Ryder, of Fall River, Mass., arrives. She has just left Fall River.

She will wed Ulysses Grant Myers, United States weather observer in Eagle City. He left New Haven 26 months ago, under orders from Washington to do pioneer work in the Klondike. Between his trips and his work as weatherman he has prospected, with rich results. He cannot afford to come back to New Haven, and sent for his

Miss Ryder is a young woman of athletic proclivities, and does not fear the perils of the Klondike. She is only 20, and beautiful. Her father is connected with the Baldwin Locomotive company, and is an extensive traveler in their interest.

RESOLUTION.

Ulysses G. Myers, a member of the Bar of the Fourth Judicial Division of Alaska, lost his life in the wreck of the steamer "Princess Sophia," on Vanderbilt Reef in Lynn Canal, Alaska, on the 26th day of October, 1918.

Mr. Myers came to Alaska from Portland, Oregon, and settled at Eagle, Alaska of which place he was a resident for the last twelve years or more. He therein carried on the active practice of his profession, and for several years he was United States Commissioner for Eagle Precinct.

He enjoyed the esteem and confidence of his fellow-townsmen, not alone as a lawyer but as a citizen and friend. In his dealings with the other members of the Bar he was fair and considerate and had a scrupulous respect for the ethics of the profession.

By his untimely death the Bar has lost a just and upright practition people of Eagle a good friend and counselor, and the Territory of Alaska a loyal ci

Therefore, be it resolved that the Bar of the Fourth Division of Alaska, by this resolution, publicly express its sincere respect for Mr. Myers and its regret at his untimely death.

And be it further resolved that these resolutions be spread in full upon the record of this day's proceedings of this Court, and that a certified copy thereof be, by the Clerk of this Court, forwarded to the nearest relative of the deceased.

To begin research on a passenger on the Princess Sophia, you can start a number of ways.

- First check the passenger list. Be open minded on the spelling of the name.
- Search for the death certificate on FamilySearch.org. Some are very faint, and some do not exist. Check for the probate file by searching the Full Text AI search at FamilySearch.org/labs. Many probate files were in Alaska, some are in Canada.
- Check FindaGrave.com for the location of the grave and any added information such as birthday or family members names. Keep in mind it may not be accurate.
- Research the 1910 US Federal Census or the 1911 Census of Canada if you think they were in Alaska or Yukon at the time.
- Check YukonGenealogy.com if they were a participant in the Gold Rush.
- Newspaper websites are a wonderful source. Search for every possible spelling.
- Check out books from the library. Look on their website for rare books or books held elsewhere. Books may offer hints you may not have seen online.

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## Cemetery Corner By Janet Richardson

### Alma and August Boström

August "Gust" was born in Balinge, Luleä, Sweden on December 28, 1871 to Lars Oloffson Boström and Anna Stina Elg Boström. He came to Dawson, YT in 1899 as a gold miner and prospector, an occupation he continued through out his life. Gust came to Fairbanks in 1904 and mined at Cleary Creek, Little El Dorado and Livengood. Up until about a year before his death, he mined at Rosy and Fish Creeks with Emil Wickstrom.

August married Alma Langström in Seattle, Washington. Alma was born on April 23, 1890 in Rorudden, Bodens, Sweden to Carl Fredrik and Anna Maria Larsdatter Langström. In 1920, Alma and Gust were living at Brooks Camp just outside Livengood where Gust was a placer miner.

Alma had come to Fairbanks prior to the spring winter breakup in 1920 in the midst of the Spanish Flu Epidemic. Alma caught the flu and was hospitalized at St. Joseph's Hospital in Fairbanks. Gust was unable to come to Fairbanks due to the quarantine between Brooks and Fairbanks, but as the flu had not made it to Brooks, he was granted premission to come to Fairbanks. On May 6, the Fairbanks Daily News-Miner reported that Alma had greatly improved and that she was likely to survive, however, she passed away the next day on May 7, 1920. Alma was the sister of Elin (Ellen) T. Langström Wickstrom, wife of Emil Wickstrom. Alma's funeral was held on May 13 and was well attended as she was a much loved pioneer of the interior. She was laid to rest at Clay Street Cemetery in the Pioneer Section. Gust was a member of the Fairbanks Elks Lodge and a life member of the Pioneers of Alaska, Igloo No. 4, Fairbanks. He passed away on September 19, 1951 at St. Joseph's in Fairbanks of heart disease and was buried at Birch Hill Cemetery in the Pioneer Section.

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
